

REVISION SKILL: CORNELL NOTE TAKING

During the Period 1 intervention, students have been introduced to a technique called 'Cornell Note-Taking' (<u>How to video</u>).

This method helps students efficiently take, organize, and review their notes. A Cornell Note page is divided into three sections:

- 1. Notes
- 2. Cues/Main Ideas/Questions
- 3. Summary

Intervention tutors have demonstrated how to use this system, and students have now started applying the technique independently.

What can you do?

Set routines early: Encourage study in a quiet, distraction-free space (without phones) in focused 30-minute sessions.

Talk about revision plans: Ask how they intend to use their study time to ensure it's effective.

Stress attendance: Remind them that regular lesson attendance strongly supports exam success.

Think big picture: Discuss why exams matter and start exploring post-GCSE options together—looking into courses or careers and their entry requirements.
