Welcome

Welcome to The Malling School's guide to supporting learning beyond the classroom. We believe that the partnership between school and home helps every student develop confidence, resilience and independence. This guide explains what homework you can expect, why it matters and how you can best support your child.

The Malling School's Approach to Learning at Home

Homework is designed to reinforce learning, develop independent study habits and prepare students for future success. We aim to set homework that is purposeful, manageable and meaningful.

How can parents and carers help?

- Establish a regular homework routine, helping to construct schedule for homework completion.
- Provide a quiet place to work where possible.
- Quizzing your child on core knowledge.
- Encourage your child to attempt tasks independently before offering help.
- Ask questions that encourage your child to explain their thinking.
- Praise effort, organisation and resilience.
- Encourage them to seek help from their teacher before the deadline, if they are unsure of how to complete the homework.
- Encourage attendance at Homework club in the Library before and after school each day.

What should parents and carers avoid?

- Completing work for students
- Teaching alternative methods/strategies
- Over-editing the student's work
- Using AI to complete work

Homework at a Glance

Using AI Responsibly

AI can be a useful study tool for explaining concepts, creating quizzes and supporting revision. It should never replace independent thinking or complete homework on a student's behalf. Students should follow teacher guidance and make sure any submitted work reflects their own understanding.

English

Homework Snapshot	
KS3	Homework is set weekly and will typically involve completion of a homework booklet, including retrieval quizzes and revision tasks. It is important for students to learn key terms and techniques as they go along as this builds to required knowledge at GCSE. I would recommend that students always have a book to read for pleasure.
KS4	Homework is set weekly and will typically involve completion of a homework booklet, including retrieval quizzes, revision tasks and reading of set texts
Platform(s) / Resources	KS3: The English homework booklets have been carefully designed to support the work completed in lessons. The key resource is the Knowledge Organiser in the booklet. KS4: Online versions of the texts and The Globe Theatre version of Romeo and Juliet

Key Takeaway: Regular reading and retrieval help students build the language, knowledge and confidence needed for success in English.

Why this homework matters

English homework is designed to build the knowledge, vocabulary and confidence students need for reading, writing and GCSE preparation. Homework booklets and knowledge organisers help students learn key terms and techniques steadily over time.

Maths

Homework Snapshot	
KS3	Homework is set weekly and will involve spending approximately 30 minutes completing tasks set on Sparx Maths
KS4	Homework is set weekly and will involve completing tasks set on Sparx Maths and completing Exam questions. This should take approximately 45 minutes.

Key Focus	Consolidation of classwork

Key Takeaway: Little and often is the key to confidence in Maths; regular practice helps methods stick.

Why this homework matters

Maths homework gives students regular practice so they can consolidate methods taught in lessons, build fluency and develop confidence with problem solving.

Possible barriers / notes

Not having the correct equipment such as calculator, ruler, compass and protractor

Science

KS3	Homework is set weekly and will involve spending approximately 30 minutes completing tasks set on Sparx Science and quizzing with the Core Knowledge Questions.
KS4	Homework is set weekly and will involve spending approximately 45 minutes completing tasks set on Sparx Science, completing exam questions and revision tasks.

Why this homework matters

Science homework helps students learn and retain core knowledge, consolidate classwork and practise applying scientific ideas to retrieval quizzes, Sparx tasks and exam-style questions.

Possible barriers / notes

Access to internet and digital devices to complete Sparx science.

Languages

Key Takeaway: Short, regular vocabulary practice is one of the most effective ways to make progress in a language.

Why this homework matters

Languages homework helps students revisit vocabulary and grammar regularly, which is essential for confidence in reading, writing, listening and speaking.

Possible barriers / notes

Not knowing how to pronounce words in French or Spanish. If this is the case, Google translate has an option where you can have Google read the word/sentence/text to the student.

Geography

Homework Snapshot	
KS3	Homework is set weekly and will involve spending approximately 20 mins completing retrieval quizzes.
KS4	Homework is set weekly and will involve completing retrieval quizzes & exam questions.
Platform(s) / Resources	KS4: Edexcel A GCSE Revision Guide (advised to purchase at Year 10 parents evening)
Key Focus	Consolidation of class work Recall of knowledge from previous topics Consolidation of classwork Exam technique

Key Takeaway: Regular retrieval helps students connect places, processes and case studies across the course.

Why this homework matters

Geography homework reinforces geographical knowledge, retrieval practice and exam technique so that students can connect ideas across topics and prepare for assessment.

Possible barriers / notes

Access to devices (phone/laptop)

History

Homework Snapshot	
KS3	Homework is set weekly and will involve completing retrieval quizzes.
KS4	Homework is set weekly and will be based around exam style questions and application of knowledge. This should take approximately 20 minutes.

Why this homework matters

History homework supports students in consolidating classwork, remembering key knowledge and developing the exam technique needed for clear historical explanations.

Possible barriers / notes

Accessing teams for quizzes at home

Sport

Homework Snapshot	
KS3	No homework is set for KS3.
KS4	Homework is set fortnightly and will involve tasks prepare students for their BTEC Sport component assessments in Year 10 (May) and Year 11 (December). Once these coursework components have been completed, homework focuses on preparation for the Component 3 examination in May of Year 11.

Key Takeaway: Regular completion of homework helps students stay on track with BTEC coursework deadlines and prepares them thoroughly for the final examination.

Why this homework matters

Sport homework is carefully planned to support students through each stage of the BTEC course. Early homework develops the knowledge and evidence needed for the internally assessed components, while later homework focuses on revising key content and practising examination skills for Component 3.

KS4	Homework is set weekly and will involve spending approximately 45 minutes completing exam questions & Tassomai retrieval quizzes.

Why this homework matters

Computer Science homework reinforces computational thinking, programming knowledge and key theory so that students can apply concepts independently.

Drama

KS4	Homework is set weekly and will involve research and completion of log writing.

Key Takeaway: Drama homework is most effective when students take ownership of rehearsal, research and reflection over time.

Why this homework matters

Drama homework helps students build the knowledge and discipline needed for practical performance, research, log writing and coursework.

Possible barriers / notes

Some Drama homework may require students to access online resources, complete written research or write up rehearsal logs. Parents and carers can support by helping students plan time for these tasks and by encouraging them to keep notes and logs up to date.

In Year 10, homework is often written and may involve researching a topic or recording ideas from lessons. In Year 11, students may also need to learn lines, practise scenes and complete written logs. Where group rehearsal or extra support is needed, students should speak to their teacher about available after-school opportunities.

Music

Homework Snapshot	
KS3	Homework is set fortnightly and will involve spending approximately 30 minutes completing the homework booklet and revision tasks.
KS4	Homework is set weekly and will involve spending approximately 45 minutes completing tasks such as continuing with coursework on PowerPoint, doing listening activities and/or practising their chosen instrument.

Key Takeaway: Short, regular practice is more effective in Music than leaving rehearsal or coursework until the last minute.

Why this homework matters

Music homework supports listening skills, subject knowledge, rehearsal habits and independent practice, especially as students progress towards coursework and performance.

Possible barriers / notes

Some Music homework may require students to listen to music online, use YouTube or access specific music platforms. For KS4 students, regular rehearsal is especially important, and students may need access to their instrument at home where possible.

Parents and carers can support by helping students find short, regular opportunities to practise. Even 10–15 minutes at a time can make a difference. At KS4, homework may look different for each student because they may be working on different instruments, pieces or coursework tasks. Students should therefore be encouraged to check Bromcom, Teams and teacher instructions carefully, and to ask for support if they are unsure what they should be working on.

Dance

Homework Snapshot	
KS3	Dance is a KS4 only subject
KS4	Homework is set weekly and will involve spending approximately 45 minutes completing tasks such as writing up work from the lesson, carrying out independent research and rehearsing practical elements from the lesson.

Key Takeaway: Short, regular rehearsal and reflection help Dance students build confidence, remember choreography and prepare effectively for practical and written coursework.

Why this homework matters

Dance homework supports students in developing practical performance skills, understanding key dance knowledge and reflecting on their progress. Tasks such as writing up lesson work, completing research and rehearsing practical elements help students prepare for coursework and assessment.

Possible barriers / notes

Some Dance homework may require students to rehearse independently, complete written reflections or access resources shared on Teams. Parents and carers can support by helping students plan regular short practice sessions and encouraging them to keep written work up to date.

Students may need a suitable space to rehearse safely at home, where possible. If space or access to resources is a difficulty, students should speak to their teacher so that support or alternative arrangements can be discussed.

Art, 3D Design, Textiles & Photography

Homework Snapshot	
KS3	None
KS4	Homework is set weekly and students should spend approximately 2 hours completing coursework tasks. In Year 10, this is supported by a homework booklet and materials provided by the department. In Year 11, students are expected to use task checklists more independently to keep coursework development on track, particularly in the lead-up to mock exams.

Key Focus	Coursework

Key Takeaway: Regular, focused coursework time helps students develop their ideas, refine their skills and keep on track with project deadlines.

Why this homework matters

Art, 3D Design, Textiles and Photography homework supports students in building a strong coursework portfolio over time. Weekly tasks help students develop ideas, practise techniques, complete research and refine work so that projects show clear progress and personal development.

Possible barriers / notes

Some homework may require students to complete practical work or continue developing coursework outside lessons. Parents and carers can support by helping students plan regular time for their work and encouraging them to keep task checklists, booklets and project deadlines up to date.

Where students find it difficult to access materials, space or equipment at home, they should attend the weekly after-school sessions on a Monday in B13.

Media Studies

KS3	Media Studies is a KS4 only subject.
KS4	Homework is set weekly and will involve revision tasks and completion of a homework booklet.

Key Takeaway: Media Studies homework is most useful when students regularly revisit key terminology and examples.

Why this homework matters

Media Studies homework helps students strengthen their knowledge of key media concepts, terminology and examples so they can prepare confidently for assessment.

KS3	Health & Social Care is a KS4 only subject.
KS4	Homework is set weekly and will involve spending approximately 30 mins completing a homework booklet, revision tasks and exam questions.

Key Takeaway: Keeping booklets safe and completing tasks on time is essential for successful coursework in Health & Social Care.

Why this homework matters

Health & Social Care homework supports coursework, exam technique and the completion of booklet tasks that help students build evidence and knowledge over time.

Possible barriers / notes

Homework booklets and additional tasks are important because they help students build the knowledge and evidence needed for their coursework. Students should keep their booklet safe and bring it to lessons when required.

Parents and carers can support by encouraging students to complete tasks on time and by helping them stay organised with deadlines. A copy of the booklet will be uploaded to the student's Teams page, so students should use this if their paper copy is misplaced or unavailable.

Frequently Asked Questions

What should I do if my child does not understand the homework?

Encourage your child to read the instructions carefully, look back at lesson notes or resources, and attempt what they can. If they remain stuck after 10-15 minutes, they should write down what they found difficult and ask their teacher for support.

How much help should I give?

The most helpful support is usually asking questions, helping with organisation and encouraging effort. Parents and carers should avoid completing the work, over-editing written tasks or teaching alternative methods that may conflict with lesson guidance.

What if my child does not have access to a device or the internet?

Please let the school know if access to technology is affecting homework. Laptops are available at homework club which runs before and after school every day in the Library (Morning session: **08:15–08:45** and After school session: **15:20–16:00**)

How can I help my child revise?

Short, regular retrieval practice is usually more effective than long last-minute revision sessions. Ask your child to explain key ideas, quiz them on knowledge organisers or vocabulary, and encourage them to revisit previous learning.

Can my child use AI for homework?

AI can be useful for explaining concepts, creating revision questions or checking understanding. It should not be used to complete homework, write answers on behalf of the student or replace independent thinking.

What if homework is causing stress at home?

Homework should support learning, not become a source of unnecessary conflict. If homework is regularly causing stress, please contact the pastoral team or inclusion team.
